## APPENDIX 2 – Responses to Questions

A question was raised by Deise Tallon – asking for consideration as to whether referees needed to be Garda Vetted as a blanket rule? She queried the legality of it. It was agreed to discuss further with Sport Ireland. Engagement has taken place with Sport Ireland in this regard. Whilst not illegal, going forward only those referees who are regularly refereeing U18 matches (both NL and age-group) and school events will require Garda Vetting. The mechanics of how this can best be administered remains a work in progress.
A question was raised about the possibility of adding a search bar to the front page of the website, which was noted. This was completed in July.
The details of the Ukrainian Refugee scheme were raised, and whether the scheme would be extended and whether new members needed to get licenses? The CEO confirmed that this would be discussed further offline, and the President added that the intention was to extend the scheme. The Board agreed to extend the programme to the end of September 2022.
